A WORD ABOUT DISCHARGE

Walking out the front doors of the hospital is the last step in the discharge process designed to prepare for a child's care at home.

- ❖ Discharge is the hospital's word describing the activities the staff and families engage in when a patient is medically ready to leave the hospital.
- ❖ Discharge involves planning and preparing for a child's and family's needs when they leave the hospital.
- ❖ Discharge is a process that can take hours or days to complete.
- ❖ Discharge is sometimes complex because it involves making the necessary arrangements for medications, supplies, home health care, and teaching.
- ❖ Many people participate in the discharge process for each patient: doctors, nurses, nurse practitioners, home pharmacy nurses, case managers, social workers, and patients and families!
- ❖ Nurses and staff involve the patient and family in the planning for discharge by teaching you, answering your questions and supporting you on making some necessary arrangements.



We Have 4 New Ways of Working Together to Prepare for Discharge in the Bass Center....



Why are we talking about Discharge during Admitting?

It may seem unusual to talk about discharge when you have just arrived at Packard Children's.

We include planning for discharge as part of the plan of care for your child while they are here. It is important to us to take every opportunity during your child's hospitalization to include you on the care team and teach you what you will need to know to confidently and safely care for your child at home.

Parent Teaching Record

Every family will have some things they will need to learn about taking their child home. A copy of your the Parent Teaching Record is located in the folder you received when you were admitted. Teaching will be provided throughout your hospital stay. You and your medical team will review the checklist on a regular basis.

Parent Hour

Parent Hour is a weekly time parents gather to learn about common topics related to your child's hospitalization, discharge, and care at home. The hour long meeting is lead by staff and experienced parents. We welcome you to attend often. Ask your nurse or social worker about it.

White Boards

A white board is located on the wall at the bedside. The white boards are used as a tool of communication between you and the staff. We welcome you to write your questions, needs, and preferences on this board.

Discharge Bead

If you are participating in Beads of Courage, you will receive your discharge bead before you go home. If you have any questions or would like to participate in the Beads of Courage program, please talk to your nurse.
